Solar Eclipse - April 8, 2024

Our partners at the Ottawa Area Intermediate School Offices shared the following information with us today. I thought you might be interested too.

Total solar eclipses are actually pretty common; there is one about every 18 months. However, they are rarely visible in the same place repeatedly (about every 330 years), which makes this a special event. A solar eclipse is when the moon is situated between the sun and the Earth in space, so it appears that the moon is blocking the sun's rays from our point of view here on Earth. It gets dark, and strange things happen during a total solar eclipse too. Animal behavior often changes, and we can sometimes see planets and comets during the daytime. On April 8, we might be able to see Venus and Jupiter in the sky, as well as a passing comet called the Pons-Brooks Comet. The next total solar eclipse is not until 2044 in the Northern Hemisphere. Due to the timing of this solar eclipse, safety is key. A partial eclipse will begin at 1:55 pm, at 3:11 pm there will be 94% coverage of the sun, and then turn back into a partial eclipse until 4:24 pm.

Because the timing of the eclipse spans our dismissal time, and there is a risk of eye damage if looking directly at the eclipse/sun, we will share a safety reminder with our students before dismissal. Here are a few safety recommendations that the OAISD suggested to share with families:

• DO NOT LOOK DIRECTLY AT THE SUN ANYTIME BEFORE, DURING, OR AFTER THE EVENT WITHOUT PROTECTIVE EYEWEAR

- Ensure viewing glasses are certified for solar eclipse viewing
- Pinhole viewers are encouraged to view the eclipse in shadow form if glasses are unavailable
- Colanders can also be used to view the eclipse
